COVER UP

Robert Wood Johnson, the former chairman of Johnson & Johnson, was infamous for his rigorous, unannounced inspections of his plants. One day, a plant manager received a 30-minute warning that Johnson was coming. In a panic, he ordered several large rolls of paper to be rushed to the roof, hoping to hide any imperfections and present a tidy workplace appearance. However, instead of praising the plant manager, Johnson walked in and immediately demanded, "What is all that junk on the roof??" What the manager didn't know was that Johnson had arrived for this surprise inspection in his personal helicopter. Johnson's disappointment was obvious—no amount of last-minute fixes could disguise the underlying issues.

This story is a powerful example of the dangers we can face in our spiritual lives as well. Just as the plant manager tried to cover up problems with a superficial fix, we sometimes attempt to hide our shortcomings, sins, or areas in need of change instead of removing them, repenting, and following Christ's example. Sure, we might be able to get away with it around friends and family. Sure, people might think that we have "cleaned up our act." But the Bible reminds us in **1 Samuel 16:7**, "For the Lord sees not as man sees: man looks on the outward appearance, but the Lord looks on the heart.." God sees beyond our temporary band-aids and quick fixes and examines the condition of our hearts.

In our walk with Christ, authenticity matters more than appearances. It can be tempting to try to mask our failures or delay addressing sin with half-hearted efforts, thinking that if we just cover them up, everything will be alright. Yet, like the uncovered "junk" on the roof, these issues eventually come to light. Jesus explained this kind of hypocritical behavior when speaking to the religious leaders of that day. In **Matthew 23:27-28**, we read, "Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For you are like whitewashed tombs, which outwardly appear beautiful, but within are full of dead people's bones and all uncleanness. So, you also outwardly appear righteous to others, but within you are full of hypocrisy and lawlessness."

How do we make sure that we are seeking authenticity instead of simply maintaining appearances? As Jesus said one verse earlier, "First clean the inside of the cup and the plate, that the outside also may be clean." (Matthew 23:26) Only genuine repentance, real change, and sincere

reliance on God's transforming power can mend our lives from the inside out.

Proverbs 28:13 says, "Whoever conceals his transgressions will not prosper, but he who confesses and forsakes them will obtain mercy." In our walk with Christ, we are called to be honest and transparent—not only with others but with ourselves before God. That begins by speaking the truth. **Ephesians 4:25** says, "Therefore, having put away falsehood, let each one of you speak the truth with his neighbor, for we are members one of another." When we practice honesty in our interactions, we build trust with one another and within our community, reflecting the integrity of Christ. And when we begin living in the truth of Christ, we are finally able to experience true freedom. **John 8:32** says, "And you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free."

A great example of this is found in David. When David first committed adultery with Bathsheba, he also tried to cover it up in a superficial way. He brought Uriah back home and acted as if all was fine. He asked Uriah questions about Joab and the battles. He casually tried to get Uriah to go back to his house. He did all these things to try and cover up his sins-eventually going so far as to have Uriah killed in battle. But all this did was cause more struggles for David. Psalm 32:3 says, "For when I kept silent, my bones wasted away through my groaning all day long." David could feel the weight of the guilt behind his cover-up. But then, Psalm 34:5 tells us, "I acknowledged my sin to you, and I did not cover my iniquity; I said, 'I will confess my transgressions to the Lord,' and you forgave the iniquity of my sin." Much like the plant manager at Johnson & Johnson, the Pharisees, and even King David, we too can be tempted to scramble for superficial solutions and hide behind a mask instead of seeking the truth, confessing our sins and shortcomings, and humbling ourselves before God. What are some areas in your life where you might be tempted to hide behind a mask? Instead of concealing them this week, commit to living a genuine life that reflects His light, drawing others into the freedom and truth that only He can provide.
