THE DANGER OF FIRE

On March 25, 1911, a fire broke out in the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory in New York City, killing 146 garment workers, most of them young immigrant women. Locked doors, poor working conditions, and lack of fire escapes trapped them inside, turning the building into a death trap. The tragedy shocked the nation and led to major labor reforms, but it also serves as a powerful illustration of the urgency of sharing and obeying the gospel. Many of the workers in the Triangle Factory assumed they were safe. They had jobs, they had skills, and they trusted that the people in charge would protect them. Everything was good until the fire came. Suddenly, they found themselves locked in with no escape.

In much the same way, many today assume that they are spiritually secure. They put their trust in their good deeds and morality, or even in their religious affiliation and personal spirituality. But without Christ, they are standing in a burning building, trapped, with no way to save themselves. Jesus says in **John 10:9** "I am the door. If anyone enters by me, he will be saved and will go in and out and find pasture." Jesus also tells us in **Matthew 7:21**, "Not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of heaven, but the one who does the will of my Father who is in heaven."

The tragedy of the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory reminds us that salvation isn't found in our own efforts or in trusting the systems and ideas of this world, it is only found in Jesus and in obeying His commands. The workers needed a way out, but none was provided. God, in His mercy, has given us a way out of sin and death through Christ. The question is, will we take it?

Another lesson that can be learned from the Triangle Factory fire is the sudden need for salvation and the call for those who can bring it. As the workers were trapped in the factory, the fireman arrived too late to save many who were in the building. Bystanders on the street could do nothing but watch in horror as people called out for help or jumped from the burning building. As Christians, we are called to a different response. Jesus says **Matthew 28:19-20**, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

We know the world is on fire, people are lost in sin, facing eternal separation from God. But unlike those helpless onlookers, we *can* do something. We have the gospel, the message of salvation, and we are commanded to share it. **Jude 1:23** says we are to "save others by snatching them out of the fire" Just as rescue workers today rush into danger to save lives, we are called to run toward the lost, offering them the only escape, Jesus Christ. We can't afford to be silent when souls are at stake.

Finally, we can also learn that there is hope even beyond the ashes. The Triangle Shirtwaist fire led to sweeping changes in labor laws, improving workplace safety and saving countless lives in the years that followed. From tragedy came transformation. In the same way, Jesus took the greatest tragedy, His own death on the cross, and turned it into the greatest victory. **1 Peter 2:24** says, "He Himself bore our sins in His body on the tree, that we might die to sin and live to righteousness. By His wounds you have been healed." Because of His sacrifice, we are not left in the ashes of sin and despair. Instead, we have a living hope, a new life, and the promise of eternity with Him.

Even tragic events that happened so long ago can teach us great spiritual truths even today. The Triangle fire reminds us that life is fragile, the world is broken, and people need saving. As the body of Christ, we must not stand idly by. We must proclaim the gospel, offering the only true rescue from the coming fire. **1 Peter 3:21** says, "Baptism, which corresponds to this, now saves you, not as a removal of dirt from the body but as an appeal to God for a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ," Let us be faithful in our calling, knowing that through Christ, we bring light, hope, and salvation to a world in desperate need.
