NOTHING IS IMPOSSIBLE WITH GOD

With Mother's Day coming up this Sunday, it's a time of year when we reflect on all that mothers have done for the world, while watching them hold their families together, even as those very families gather to celebrate them. Of course, I've always appreciated how much my mother and grandmothers have done for myself and our family, but I didn't truly grasp the full depth of it all until I watched my wife become a mother herself. It's truly something magical to witness. How can one person possibly balance, or even fully comprehend, all that a mother does? And yet, day in and day out, there they are, doing it all. I often find myself asking Taylor how she manages to juggle a household, a career, a master's program, two children, four calendars, and a seemingly endless list of other tasks every single day. Her answer is always the same: "I don't know, I just do."

But I guess that is what makes mothers so special, the ability to do something even when they don't fully understand the why or how. This is a characteristic we are able to also see in Mary, the mother of Jesus. And if we take a closer look at her account, we are able to discover something both beautiful and relatable to each of us: how to respond to God's words even when we don't fully understand them.

In Luke 1:31, we find the moment when Gabriel says to Mary, "you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus." Mary didn't doubt the truth of the messages, she believed it. But still, she had questions. Her response? "How will this be, since I am a virgin?" (Luke 1:34) Gabriel goes on to tell Mary of how this miraculous conception will take place, even telling her that Elizabeth, the mother of John, who was once barren had conceived a son. Then Gabriel closes by saying "For nothing will be impossible with God." (Luke 1:37)

Isn't that how we often feel when reading the Bible? We hear God speak through Scripture. We believe what He says. And yet, we still ask, "How can this be?" It's not that we are skeptics or unbelievers who reject His Word. No, we accept it as truth, we just struggle to understand how it fits into our lives. But just as He did for Mary, God also calls for us to have faith in Him, because nothing is impossible with God. But it didn't end there for Mary either. Mary's life was filled with divine mysteries.

Did she fully grasp the meaning behind Elizabeth's greeting when she called her "the mother of my Lord"? (**Luke 1:43**) Did she know the prophecies that pointed to Bethlehem as the Messiah's birthplace? (**Micah 5:2**) Is it

possible that as she made the eighty-mile journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem, she had some understanding of how God was working through her life to fulfill His will? Maybe. Maybe not. What's certain is this: we now know the whole story. Mary didn't. She was living it in real time, day by day, with questions still lingering.

After Jesus was born, we find shepherds who come from the fields to see the newborn Messiah. They share with Mary what the angels had told them in the fields (**Luke 2:15-17**). Mary did not push their message aside either. **Luke 2:19** says, "Mary treasured up all these things, pondering them in her heart." She didn't have all the answers, but she held on to every word, every moment, storing it deep within.

The idea of Mary storing these things up and *pondering* them is deeply significant. In fact, Luke mentions three times that Mary "pondered" or "treasured these things in her heart" (Luke 1:29; 2:19, **51**). This suggests that she was intentionally piecing together the events she was witnessing, comparing them, and trying to understand what God was doing. She thought carefully about everything she had heard—from Gabriel, from Elizabeth, from the shepherds—and sought to connect the dots. Mary reflected, compared, and treasured it all, quietly carrying hope and wonder in her soul. That's the example she gives us. And it's a lesson we can apply in our own relationship with God.

When you read Scripture and encounter something confusing or difficult, don't ignore it or rush past it. Keep those words close. Reflect on them. Compare them with what God has already revealed to you. Some truths take time to unfold. But if you store them in your heart and keep coming back to them, God will bring clarity.

Jesus said, "Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied" (**Matthew 5:6**). So, keep that hunger alive. Hold on to His words. Ponder them deeply. And trust that, in time, God will help you see what you couldn't before—because "nothing will be impossible with God."
