WILL YOU STILL TRUST HIM

This past week, my mother had to relive something that no parent or grandparent wants to experience. Taylor had to work, and I had a previously scheduled appointment, so my mom had to take Rhett to get his four-month-old shots. From what I've heard, it went about as well as any set of baby shots can go. She told me Rhett was smiling and laughing as they weighed him and took his measurements. He was laying on the table, eagerly waiting for whatever came nextcompletely unaware. And then... stick. Not just once, but four times. After the last shot, Rhett was screaming in horror, unsure of what had just happened. By the end, both Rhett and my mom were in tears. What Rhett couldn't understand in that moment though was that what she allowed to happen was for his own good. But it was what she said after the appointment that I will always remember. After it was all done, my mom said, " I hope that he will still trust me."

That one line stuck with me, because it reminded me of how God often deals with us when it comes to our faith. Sometimes, He leads us into situations that don't make sense, places that hurt, stretch us, and feel overwhelming. He doesn't always call us to comfort or clarity, but to trust Him. When we're in the middle of pain, when everything around us seems impossible, that's when our faith is truly tested. Do we believe that He knows what's best for us, even when we don't understand it?

2 Corinthians 4:17-18 says, "or this light momentary affliction is preparing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison, as we look not to the things that are seen but to the things that are unseen. For the things that are seen are transient, but the things that are unseen are eternal." Life has a way of weighing us down. Whether it's pain, disappointment, illness, or uncertainty, the struggles we face can feel anything but "light" or "momentary." Yet, Paul who endured beatings, shipwrecks, imprisonment, and much more describes his own suffering with those very words.

How could he say that? Because he had a different perspective. He fixed his eyes not on the pain, but on the promise. He chose to trust God, even in the hardest moments. That kind of trust isn't easy, especially during difficult or painful times, when all we can often see is the darkness in front of us. But even then, God calls us to look to Him in faith, because He will take care of you.

In Matthew 14, we find Jesus' disciples in a boat and the waves and wind are pushing against them.

Suddenly, off in the distance, they see Jesus walking towards them. Verse 26 tells us that when they saw Him, they were terrified. After Jesus told them not to be afraid, "Peter answered him, "Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water." He said, "Come."So Peter got out of the boat and walked on the water and came to Jesus. But when he saw the wind, he was afraid, and beginning to sink he cried out, "Lord, save me."(**Matthew 14:28-30**)

It was at that moment that Peter did what many do when facing trials. He took his focus away from the one in control and began to look at the problems all around. He began to doubt his own ability to stand against the wind and the waves. But, it was at that same moment, Peter learned how to overcome those struggles. He called out to Jesus. **Matthew 14:31-33** tells us that "Jesus immediately reached out his hand and took hold of him, saying to him, "O you of little faith, why did you doubt?" And when they got into the boat, the wind ceased. And those in the boat worshiped him, saying, "Truly you are the Son of God."

Jesus not only saved Peter from sinking, but He also silenced the storm. That's what God does. He may not remove the struggle right away, but He promises to be with us through it, and to bring us safely to the other side. **1 Corinthians 10:13** says, "No temptation has overtaken you that is not common to man. God is faithful, and he will not let you be tempted beyond your ability, but with the temptation he will also provide the way of escape, that you may be able to endure it."

God is faithful. He will carry you through the storms of life, through the pain, through the trials. But here's the real question: *Will you still trust Him*? Even when it hurts, even when it doesn't make sense, even when the "shots" come and leave us crying, will we trust that our Father still loves us and is doing what's best? "Do not fear what you are about to suffer...Be faithful unto death, and I will give you the crown of life." (**Revelation 2:10**) He's not asking for perfection. He's asking for trust. Will you give it to Him?
