NO MISTAKEN IDENTITY IN HEAVEN

In July of 2021, something remarkable happened in the quiet Wilson County Memorial Park Cemetery. One body was exhumed, and another was laid to rest in its place. Why such an unusual exchange? To understand, we must go back to the story of Captain Glenn Walker, a Marine who was one of over 1,100 U.S. servicemen killed during the brutal Battle of Tarawa in World War II.

In the years that followed, the remains of 532 Marines were recovered from the battlefield, and efforts began to identify them. Among the artifacts found were two dog tags belonging to Captain Walker. Assuming the remains matched the tags, his body was sent home to Lebanon in 1947, where his family held a funeral.

Fast forward to 2016. The Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency received permission to exhume and re-examine 94 sets of unidentified remains from the Tarawa recovery. Their work uncovered a startling truth: Captain Walker's actual remains had been buried in Hawaii, at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific, under the marker "Tarawa Unknown X-198." Once this discovery was confirmed, the mistaken burial was corrected. On July 24, 2021, Captain Walker was finally laid to rest in his hometown, 74 years after his family had first gathered to mourn him.

This powerful story of misplaced remains and a longawaited homecoming echoes a very similar account found in Genesis 50. But in this case, there was no mistake or confusion. In Genesis 50:24-26 we read that "Joseph said to his brothers, "I am about to die, but God will visit you and bring you up out of this land to the land that He swore to Abraham, to Isaac, and to Jacob." Then Joseph made the sons of Israel swear, saying, "God will surely visit you, and you shall carry up my bones from here." So, Joseph died, being 110 years old. They embalmed him, and he was put in a coffin in Egypt." Joseph made it clear: Egypt was not his final home. His instructions weren't just practical; they were linked to a spiritual promise.

In Hebrews 11:22, we read, "By faith Joseph, at the end of his life, made mention of the exodus of the Israelites and gave directions concerning his bones." Joseph was so confident in God's promise to bring His people to the Promised Land that he had them swear an oath to carry his bones with them. As commentator Albert Barnes puts it: "He could not have exacted this oath, nor could they have taken it, unless both he and they had a sure confidence that what God had spoken would be performed."

Jospeh believed God's word without hesitation, and we can see that the same faith passed down, eventually taking root in the heart of Moses. Hebrews 11:24-26 says, "By faith Moses, when he was grown up, refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter, choosing rather to be mistreated with the people of God than to enjoy the fleeting pleasures of sin. He considered the reproach of Christ greater wealth than the treasures of Egypt, for he was looking to the reward." Moses turned away from a life of royal privilege because he trusted in the greater promise of God. And when the time came to leave Egypt, he made sure to honor Joseph's request.

Exodus 13:19 tells us that "Moses took the bones of Joseph with him, for Joseph had made the sons of Israel solemnly swear, saying, 'God will surely visit you, and you shall carry up my bones with you from here." And finally, after 40 years of wandering and countless trials, that promise was fulfilled. Joshua 24:32 records, "As for the bones of Joseph, which the people of Israel brought up from Egypt, they buried them at Shechem, in the piece of land that Jacob bought from the sons of Hamor the father of Shechem for a hundred pieces of money. It became an inheritance of the descendants of Joseph." God's promise was kept, and Joseph's faith is a testament to the faithfulness of God.

In the end, although the resting places of Captain Walker, Joseph, and even ourselves are meaningful, they ultimately point us to something far greater. The most important resting place is not one found in any cemetery, but the one that lasts for eternity. Just as God kept His promise to bring Israel into the Promised Land, He has promised us a place of eternal rest through Jesus Christ. 2 Corinthians 1:20-22 says, "For all the promises of God find their Yes in him. That is why it is through him that we utter our Amen to God for his glory. And it is God who establishes us with you in Christ, and has anointed us, and who has also put his seal on us and given us his Spirit in our hearts as a guarantee."

There will be no mistaken identity in heaven. Christ will know His own and will bring them home. As Paul writes in 1 Thessalonians 4:17, "Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air, and so we will always be with the Lord." That is the eternal homecoming we long for. And just like Joseph, we can trust that what God has promised, He will surely do.
