### **DEFENDING THE CHRISTIAN FAITH**

When I was a child, one of my relatives set out to hike the entire Appalachian Trail. He studied maps, read books, and talked with people who had firsthand experience. He trained hard and prepared thoroughly for the long trek up the East Coast. Along the way, he kept a journal that my parents later printed, a story I've always loved reading. But his success didn't happen by chance; it was the result of careful preparation.

Imagine you're about to hike the Appalachian Trail. You know the journey will be long and challenging, and the weather unpredictable. But you've trained, studied, and prepared for what lies ahead. As you begin your trek, you meet another hiker on the trail who is struggling and uncertain. They notice your steady pace and confident steps, and they ask, "How are you so sure of where you're going?"

That's your moment, not to boast, but to share. So, you pull out your map, show them your compass, and explain about the guide who showed you the way. You didn't get here by guessing. You've prepared, you've followed a trusted path, and now you're ready to help someone else find it too. That's the heart of **1 Peter 3:15**, which says "but in your hearts honor Christ the Lord as holy, always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and respect."

Your hope in Christ isn't just personal, it's visible. And when others notice your peace, your purpose, and your perseverance, they'll ask. The question is, will you be ready to show them the way? That is why Christian apologetics, the defense of the Christian faith, has never been more important. Because apologetics isn't simply about having all the answers, it's about being a faithful guide who points others to the truth you've already found. It is about being prepared for conversations that matter eternally.

Many in our world today believe that truth is relative, "what's true for you isn't true for me." But Scripture teaches that truth is not fluid, it is certain, and it's grounded in the nature of God. Jesus said, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me" (John 14:6). That's an exclusive claim, and it requires courage to share in a morally relative world. Christian apologetics can help us explain why we trust that Jesus is the truth, and not just one option among many. After all, He fulfilled countless prophecies throughout His life, death, and resurrection, that prove He is the way, truth, and life.

In Jesus' lifetime, he fulfilled over 300 prophecies recorded in the Old Testament, centuries before He was born. And Jesus fulfills them in stunning detail. For example, **Isaiah 53** describes a suffering servant pierced for our transgressions, written over 700 years before Christ. **Micah 5:2** predicts Jesus would be born in Bethlehem. **Psalm 22** describes crucifixion, and the details surrounding it, centuries before it was used as a method of execution. Jesus didn't just live a good life; He lived a *foretold* life.

We could even talk about how nature itself speaks of our Divine Creator. The natural world around us is one of the strongest testimonies to the existence of God. **Romans 1:20** tells us, "For his invisible attributes, namely, his eternal power and divine nature, have been clearly perceived, ever since the creation of the world, in the things that have been made. So, they are without excuse." From the fine-tuning of the universe to the complexity of DNA, creation cries out for a Creator. Apologetics can bridge science and faith, not to prove God like a math equation, but to show that belief in Him is supported by evidence and absolute truth.

One of the most effective Christian apologists in history would have to be Paul. He never shied away from defending the gospel of Christ. Whether it was before philosophers in Athens or rulers in Rome, he always made a case for Christ. As he wrote in Romans 1:16, "I am not ashamed of the gospel, for it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes". Unfortunately, in our society, there are many who think a belief in God and faith in Christ means you must check your brain in at the door. But Christianity calls for a thoughtful, informed belief. Jesus Himself said the greatest commandment is to "love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind" (Matthew 22:37). Apologetics is an act of service to God and others, as it uses the mind to honor God and serve others.

In a world full of questions, Christian apologetics provides faithful, reasoned answers. It equips believers to stand firm, reach out, and reflect the truth of Christ with clarity and compassion. It reminds us that faith is not blind; it sees clearly through the lens of truth, reason, and love. So, the next time someone asks *why* you believe, be ready, not to argue, but to invite them into a life-changing truth. **Andrew Spivey**
