HIS WORD

In the history of homeownership, it used to be that when something went wrong, you called a professional. If an outlet sparked, you called an electrician. If the toilet leaks, you call a plumber. If you need a new kitchen, you called a contractor. Most people wouldn't even dream of doing those jobs themselves because there were experts for that.

But in the 1960s, something shifted. The DIY—or *Do It Yourself*—movement took off. Suddenly, people realized they could tackle home projects on their own. With the right books like *Audel's DIY Encyclopedia* or *The Black & Decker Home Improvement Book*, anyone could be their own handyman. Today, it's even easier. Thanks to YouTube, you can learn how to sew curtains, fix a sink, or lay a concrete foundation, all from your phone. The principle remains the same: with a little guidance and the right tools, you *can* do it yourself.

That same principle applies to our spiritual lives too. Sometimes, God calls us to do things we feel totally unqualified for, things we'd rather leave to the "professionals." But the Bible is full of everyday people who, with God's help, did incredible things. Take Moses, for example. In **Exodus 3**, when the Lord spoke to Moses through the burning bush and called him to lead the Israelites out of slavery in Egypt, Moses had serious doubts. He asked, "Who am I that I should go to Pharaoh and bring the children of Israel out of Egypt?" (**Exodus 3:11**) Moses felt completely unqualified. He raised objection after objection: "What if they don't believe me?" "I'm not eloquent in speech." "Please, send someone else." "I'm not good enough." Yet, with God's guidance, Moses stood before Pharaoh and led the Israelites out of Egypt.

Or consider Gideon. When God called him to lead Israel against the Midianites, he felt completely inadequate. In **Judges 6:14–15**, it says: "And the Lord turned to him and said, 'Go in this might of yours and save Israel from the hand of Midian; do not I send you?' And he said to him, 'Please, Lord, how can I save Israel? Behold, my clan is the weakest in Manasseh, and I am the least in my father's house." But with God's direction, Gideon led just 300 men to defeat an army of 135,000.

Even Paul, admitted in **2 Corinthians 11:6**, "Even if I am unskilled in speaking, I am not so in knowledge; indeed, in every way we have made this plain to you in all things." Still, he preached the gospel boldly wherever he went. Scripture is packed with accounts of ordinary men and women doing extraordinary things. Not because they were experts, but because they were willing. Mary, the mother of Jesus, wasn't an experienced mother of twelve. She was a young, engaged virgin when God chose her to carry His Son

(Luke 1:26–38, 46–56). Jesus didn't recruit the religious elites to follow Him. He called fishermen, a tax collector, and even a zealot. What did all these ordinary "DIYers" have in common? God promised to be *with* them.

When Moses stood trembling before the burning bush, overwhelmed by the idea of confronting Pharaoh, God reassured him in Exodus 3:12, "I will be with you" When Gideon felt completely unqualified to lead Israel's army, God gave him the same promise. In Judges 6:16, "And the Lord said to him, 'But I will be with you, and you shall strike the Midianites as one man." After Moses died, Joshua had to step into his shoes and lead the people into the Promised Land. Naturally, he was afraid. But God encouraged him in Joshua 1:5-6. "No man shall be able to stand before you all the days of your life. Just as I was with Moses, so I will be with you. I will not leave you or forsake you. Be strong and courageous, for you shall cause this people to inherit the land that I swore to their fathers to give them." Even Paul, who admitted he wasn't a gifted speaker, held on to the same confidence, not in himself, but in the presence of God. He wrote in Romans 8:31, "What then shall we say to these things?" If God is for us. who can be against us?"

So don't wait until you feel "qualified" to do God's will. God doesn't call the qualified, He qualifies the called. If He wanted professionals, He would have chosen them. But a humble, teachable heart, someone willing to say *all that you say I will do (Exodus 24:3)*, is far more useful than someone who thinks they already know it all. We aren't called to know everything. We're called to know *God*, to trust that He is with us, equips us, and will never leave us. We simply need to offer our lives and gifts to Him, allowing Him to use us however He sees fit.

We need to offer our talents and our lives to Him so that He can use us as He sees fit. After all, isn't that the reason we're here? When Paul was speaking in Athens, he told the crowd that God "made from one man every nation of mankind to live on all the face of the earth, having determined allotted periods and the boundaries of their dwelling place, that they should seek God, and perhaps feel their way toward him and find him. Yet he is actually not far from each one of us," (Acts 17:26-27) God is not far from you. He has given you the greatest instruction manual the world has ever known, His Word. But in order to follow it, you must do it yourself. No one else can do it for you.
