GOD'S PATH

A mother bakes a fresh batch of brownies for a school bake sale and warns her son not to eat any before she leaves the kitchen to get ready. Suddenly, the little boy feels the pull of temptation. Right there on the table sits a warm, chocolatey brownie he has been smelling all day. He looks around to see if anyone is watching, trying to decide if he'll get caught. Little does he know, he's already caught—not by his mother, but by the power of sin within.

We've all been there. We've all given in. Maybe you're in a hurry and need to turn around. You see a sign that says *No U-Turn*, but the road looks clear. You check your surroundings, see no one's coming, and make the turn anyway. Or maybe you're at work, buried under emails and deadlines, yet you feel the urge to sneak in a little online shopping on company time. You tell yourself, "Everyone else probably does it too," and give in. Other times you resist the temptation, only to feel frustrated later, like missing out on a sale, and you wrestle with the "what if" all day.

Every day, we feel the power of temptation and sin, sometimes as a fleeting reward, sometimes as painful consequences. Moses is a great example of this struggle. **Hebrews 11:24–26** tells us, "By faith Moses, when he was grown up, refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter, choosing rather to be mistreated with the people of God than to enjoy the fleeting pleasures of sin. He considered the reproach of Christ greater wealth than the treasures of Egypt, for he was looking to the reward."

Moses rejected the pleasures of Pharaoh's palace, pleasures and entertainments that rivaled any kingdom of the world. Instead, he chose suffering with God's people. Make no mistake, sin offers very real pleasure. Talk to someone who has struggled with addiction, and they may tell you there's no greater feeling than that first high. But it vanishes quickly, leaving them chasing an experience that never returns. The pleasures of sin are fleeting. That's how sin works.

When we lash out in anger, it feels good for a moment to release the frustration, but the relief doesn't last. When we're stressed or discouraged, we may wallow in self-pity or look for escape in things like drugs, alcohol, immorality, or even comfort food. Sure, it dulls the pain, but only temporarily. What remains afterward is deeper: a further fall into shame and guilt.

Sin not only tempts us with pleasure; it also threatens us with punishment when we refuse. This is what Moses endured when he chose God's people over Pharaoh's house. It's what Joseph experienced when he resisted Potiphar's wife. Daniel faced the same threat when he refused to eat the king's food and again when he continued praying to God despite a decree against it. Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego were threatened with fire when they refused to bow before Nebuchadnezzar's image.

Jesus reminds us in **Matthew 5:10–12**: "Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are you when others revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for so they persecuted the prophets who were before you."

So how do we overcome sin's power, its rewards of pleasure and threats of punishment? First, we must recognize sin for what it is. Picture it like a river's current, pushing against us, trying to sweep us along. Each temptation urges us to bend to its will. But we have a choice. We can give in, which is easier in the moment, but **James 1:15** warns us that, "desire when it has conceived gives birth to sin, and sin when it is fully grown brings forth death."

Or we can be like Joseph, Moses, Daniel, and the prophets—resisting sin and choosing God. Paul explains this battle in **Galatians 5:16–17**: "But I say, walk by the Spirit, and you will not gratify the desires of the flesh. For the desires of the flesh are against the Spirit, and the desires of the Spirit are against the flesh, for these are opposed to each other, to keep you from doing the things you want to do." The pull of the flesh is strong—so strong Paul even describes it as "the law of sin."

Yet there is hope. Romans 7:23–25 says, "but I see in my members another law waging war against the law of my mind and making me captive to the law of sin that dwells in my members. Wretched man that I am! Who will deliver me from this body of death? Thanks be to God through Jesus Christ our Lord! So then, I myself serve the law of God with my mind, but with my flesh I serve the law of sin." Through Christ, we have the power to resist. We don't have to gratify the desires of the flesh. Each day, with His strength, we can choose God's path.
